

Yellow cells - stated as looking for the Clarks in the Police Diary. The police on patrol would not doubt be keeping their eyes open for the boys. But unless they had police from the car station with them it would be unlikely they could do anything else. It was never stated in the diary that they were accompanied by other police. However it appears that confrontation with the boys did not arise.

Suspected robberies - brown indicates a warrant is out, but no court case resulted; purple - no warrant, no court case.

NB - this diary is only for the Broadwood Police Station - some robberies could have been investigated by the police at Major's Creek, Araluen, Ballalaba, Quambouan or Goolburra.

Bush - with the increase in police numbers after the Specials were killed, patrols with more police, could go to different areas on the same night but it was rarely specified as to which parts of the bush they were looking or the distances they covered.
