STICKING-UP AT GUNDAROO.--Last Saturday three bushrangers, said to be the two Clarkes and Scott, were met at Gundaroo by a party of horsemen whom they detained and compelled to show them the back way to Fraser's store, where they stuck-up the in-mates and robbed the store of sundry goods. They only remained about twenty minutes. The police had gone out to escort the up mail, and arrived at the scene of the robbery shortly after the bushrangers decamped, and had actually travelled the very road pursued by the bushrangers. There was no trace of the gang discovered after their departure.

STICKING UP AT GUNDAROO— On Saturday last, between 8 and 9 p m., the store of Mr. Fraser, of Gundaroo, was stuck up by three armed bushrangers, supposed to be Clarke's gang. They were armed with revolvers and revolving rifles. The property stolen consisted of Crimean shirts, doeskin coats, saddle and saddle-bags (makers, Alder son and Sons), colonial bridles by same maker, blankets, stays, silk and cotton kerchiefs, coburgs in piece, and a hunting watch with leather albert and silver seal and key. The quantity stolen is not yet known. The robbers held possession of the premises fully two hours, bailing up not only the inmates but also Mr. Moran of Goulburn, F. Jobbins of Gundaroo, F. Stroud (the Queanbeyan mail-driver), and George Yeans, in the employ of Mr. Edgar. The robbers were not disguised in any way. The police passed the store about an hour previous to the robbery, going towards the Lake, thinking the mail was stuck up as it was very late that night, two and a half hours behind time. The police did not return till 11 p.m., when the robbers had cleared out about an hour. Although the police have been most active in their pursuit of the scoundrels, nothing has yet been heard of their whereabouts. A pair of red blankets, a portion of the stolen property, was found about a mile from the store, in the direction of Lake George.— *Goulburn Herald*, March 6.
